- Allowing these definitions to blend and expand opens the way for richer and more meaningful perceptions






The art of seeing beyond definitions is an invitation to freedom.






## Where Do We Come From? What Are We? Where Are We Going?



"The questions posed in the title and indeed in the painting itself are perennial concerns about the human condition that continue to resonate with viewers today: **origins, identity, purpose,** and **destiny**."



Dalí's interest in quantum physics and the scientific discoveries of the time and the notion that reality can be broken down into subatomic particles invisible to our eyes is a clear way of seeing "beyond definitions".

By taking a closer look at the physical world and our perceptions of it, we find a complexity that goes beyond what our senses initially tell us. The painting challenges the traditional, limited view of time, space and memory.

When we see beyond labels, we begin to perceive the complexity and individuality in each person, situation, or event.

We avoid making hasty judgments and embrace the idea that just as colors mix to form new shades, human beings are made up of multiple experiences, stories, and perspectives that don't always fit into a single definition.
